

Friends of Nicholas Everitt Park: UPDATE

We've had a lovely summer and have been busy, however it has also been slightly testing as we haven't been able to complete all tasks, but we have tried very hard – so thank you to all the volunteers who have turned up every Thursday morning.

The Marigolds were planted later than usual, however, they have developed well and have put on a magnificent display in the circle flowerbed.

The expanded flowerbed facing Bridge Road has been planted up. We required a large quantity of plants, so we decided to purchase garden ready plug plants. They are all planted and flowering. The next and subsequent years should have a nice succession of summer flowering perennials. Thanks must go to East Suffolk Councillor **Edward Back** who provided a £300 grant money from his ECB funds. Every penny was spent on the plants for the flowerbed and money from FONEP's funds were used to buy plants for the hanging baskets, and boat planters, and Marigold seeds.

Our funds are raised by selling a variety of items on our sales table on a Thursday morning, so *thank you* if you have purchased anything, we appreciate the support.

The Wallflower seedlings are growing well and ready to move on to their next stage of growth. These will replace the Marigolds in the circle flowerbed later in the year.

Nicholas Everitt Park was awarded its 14th consecutive **Green Flag** this year. The judging took place in early May, and the judge was very sympathetic about the extremely wet weather we experienced earlier this year which restricted some of the work due to the park being waterlogged. Nevertheless, he was very impressed with the work which had been carried out and the plans for the extended flowerbed. This wouldn't have been possible without the help and support of everyone involved so we would like to thank our volunteers, Adrian the gardener, Nicholas Everitt Park Trust and Oulton Broad Parish Council.

A few suggestions were made, and these have been taken on board and will be discussed by Nicholas Everitt Park Trust and the Oulton Broad Parish Council. We are always looking for ways to improve the floral display in the various flowerbeds and other areas of the park, so any ideas are always welcome.

Lowestoft Museum

BROAD HOUSE RESTORATION WORKS



In September, scaffolding was erected at Broad House in preparation for building works which will last until at least the end of 2024.

Lowestoft Museum has received funding from Arts Council England Museums and Estates Development Fund (MEND) for works to address issues of damp and water ingress in the building. The aim of the project is to lower the relative humidity in the museum galleries and improve conditions

for the museum's important historic collections, but the project will also safeguard an important listed building.

This phase of works will restore and replace rainwater goods (guttering and downpipes) and flat roofs and make

good some of the damage caused by failing systems, such as repointing and masonry repairs. A significant proportion of the works are focussed on addressing standing water in the building's cellar. The work has been awarded to local building company, AJBuilder and is being managed by Architect Tim Buxbaum who has significant experience of managing conservation projects in listed buildings in Suffolk.

The museum is working in partnership with the Nicholas Everitt Park Trust to deliver this project and is grateful for the support of many other funders and partners including

Lowestoft Town Council, East Suffolk Council and the Association for Suffolk Museums.

The works are being managed so that as far as possible the Museum can remain open for the rest of the season for further updates please see the Museum's Facebook page.

An interview with Rotary by Rebekah Lark, Editor

I had the opportunity to meet and talk with four of the Lowestoft Rotary members - Brian Hunter, John Hemming, Vice President Tracey Bromley and President of Rotary and Councillor of Oulton Broad Parish Council David Bromley.

I was fascinated with the activities that Rotary Clubs support to the local community, especially in the support of children; one of their fantastic activities is Crucial Crew.

This is an annual event and aimed at year 6 pupils from 32 of the local primary schools, to get advice and learn all about safety from different professional organisations. **Brian Hunter** spoke to me in detail about the event and explained its purpose. He told me that this event is of great importance to the pupils, with advice from the eight scenarios delivered, to keep safe in their daily lives. There are eight different, very life-like scenarios for the children to experience. The scenarios on offer are kindly organised and displayed by volunteers from the police service, the fire service, lifeguards, with support from Oulton Broad Water Sports Clubs, St. Johns Ambulance service and others.

They then go around in groups of 12 with a volunteer and spend 12 minutes at each scenario before moving along to the next. All pupils who attend leave the event with a certificate, a goodie bag full of leaflets from each organisation, and the hope is that they more importantly are leaving with knowledge about keeping safe. Crucial Crew has been going on for 18 years now and is very well attended by the primary schools, and the children look forward to going along. This is a free activity for the schools of the local area and for the children to attend, as it is sponsored by local Rotary Clubs who pull together funds to keep the event ongoing. Organisations like Suffolk County Council have supported the event and given donations to the club. Crucial Crew is organised and run by volunteers who give their time; without them it would not be possible to provide this event.

John Hemming explained that *Dictionaries* 4 *life* is a project directed at year three pupils attending the Lowestoft Primary Schools; each of them receives a free dictionary which is theirs for life. The dictionaries are colour coded and have pictures to help the children identify certain words.

1,000 dictionaries are funded annually by the Rotary Clubs and donations from generous organisations, such as the Pye Foundation who have donated for 12 years towards the programme. The aim of *Dictionaries 4 life* is to support young people with their literacy skills, and to help grow their confidence and knowledge of words.

I've been very fortunate to be able to talk with John, Brian, Tracey and David; it has been interesting to hear about some of the amazing things that Rotary provides. Rotarians believe in **Service Above Self**, and this shows in the events and programmes supporting this area's young people.

Bonds Meadow

Bonds Meadow, a serene wildlife sanctuary, is situated in the heart of Oulton Broad off Sands Lane and is a shining example of how community-led conservation can create a thriving ecosystem.

Over the past year, the meadow has undergone a remarkable transformation, thanks in part to the increased rainfall that has not only replenished the ponds but also revitalised the undergrowth and tree canopies, enhancing the habitat's complexity and, consequently, its biodiversity. In addition, what looks to have been a successful attempt to increase the local bird population, 34 new nest boxes were installed during the winter months.

The introduction of an alternative footpath known as Sam's Way, meandering from Sands Lane to the kissing gate has brought additional light to the area, has promoted the growth of new plant species and extended the woodland experience.



The dedicated volunteers who maintain and nurture Bonds Meadow have also taken steps to share their passion and efforts with the wider community through an updated website published this spring, inviting others to experience the beauty of this natural haven and possibly support and contribute to its ongoing preservation and enhancement.
